

Rock music brought to schools in an interactive musical show which teaches valuable lessons

LOCATION: Vcar, Almera

DURATION: 1'46"

SUMMARY: The "School of Rock" project has been running since 2012, making children curious about the types of music that are not normally included in the school curriculum, such as reggae or swing. Through an interactive musical show, they travel through music history, but are also taught something more: values such as equality and hard work. It began in Almera, but has now been performed throughout Andalusia and other parts of Spain, with more than 60,000 children attending the shows.

Welcome to 'The School of Rock', an interactive show for infant and primary school children. It was started by a group of teachers in the music group "En espera", with its primary objective to show the children some ideas.
