

Invisible restoration in the Alhambra with a fluorescent mortar

LOCATION: Granada

DURATION: 1'37"

SUMMARY: A mortar that is not distinguishable by normal light but is perfectly visible with an ultraviolet light. The Patronage of the Alhambra has a patent on this mortar to differentiate between the changes made in the heritage. It has been used for some time in the Nazarí monument, and those responsible for the conservation of patrimony sites in other countries have expressed interest.

VTR:

A mortar for restoration that is not distinguishable by normal light but is perfectly visible when applying ultraviolet light. The Patronage of the Alhambra has a patent on this mortar, and it is already being used in the Alhambra. It is a useful tool for the restoration professionals such as those working in the plaster workshops.

"This new method allows you to make all kinds of volumetric reintegration, or polychromy details of any kind of material. It is completely invisible except for the radiation of ultraviolet light. It's a material that we could work with, guaranteed that we wouldn't be committing falsification of our patrimony."

It is applied in the same way as other similar materials, but it contains fluorescent properties that glow under ultraviolet light.

More than only in the plaster workshops of the Alhambra, this mortar will be used in the Tin Mal Mosque in Morocco and the Santa Clara Monastery in Tordesillas. They are also in contact with those responsible for the patrimony conservation in England and the Louvre Museum in Paris.

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
