

Baloncodo, an inclusive sport with connections to Andalusian culture

LOCATION: Arroyo Coche, Almogía (Málaga)

DURATION: 1'42"

SUMMARY: A young professor from Malaga has created a new sport. It's called baloncodo, a mixed, inclusive, and educational sport. By hitting the ball with the elbow the ball has to bounce three times in the opposite field to get a point. Baloncodo is played in teams of four, two girls and two boys, and its terminology has references to elements of Andalusian culture.

VTR:

The sport that is being practiced by these students is called baloncodo and is the creation of this young man from Málaga with a PhD in Educational Sciences. One of its characteristics is that the ball is thrown with the elbow, but most importantly, that is a mixed inclusive sport.

They form two teams of four players each, two girls and two boys, and hit the ball with their elbow, trying to make the ball bounce three times in the opposite field. Other of the special characteristics of this sport is its terminology that references aspects of Andalusian culture. The ball, for example, called the infante, pays homage to the figure of Blas Infante, one of the symbols of Andalusia.
